Dear Grandma,

I hope you are feeling better than you did when we left you. We are all well up here.

We had a fine trip. It was about five o'clock when we left the suburbs of Los Angeles. We traveled along and covered a long distance then we got on the wrong road and traveled sixty-five miles before we found our mistake. We were almost down to Needles. Well, that set us back two and a half hours. We passed the Union Pacific buses and never saw them again.

We arrived in Salt Lake the next day June 16 at two thirty mountain standard time. We stayed in Salt Lake that night and left the next morning at eight o'clock.

We stopped in Logan and saw the town. We saw the Logan temple and the A. C. where Dad went to school.

We came through Logan Canyon and stopped at the spring and ate lunch. While speaking about lunch tell Mrs. Wright that the sandwiches were sure good and we certainly enjoyed them. Tell aunt Ida that the pudding cup cakes were good too. The candy is all gone too.

When we came up over the mountain and saw Bear Lake we were glad to be home. The lake was sure beautiful. I wish you could

have seen the lake then. It was a deep blue with a white line (the sandy beach) next to the mountains.

We arrived home about three o'clock in the afternoon June 17. I should have written to you before but I have been busy doing nothing. Monday I went with Dad to Paris and then to Montpelier. While in Paris Dad went in to a wheat meeting and I went around town and talked with my school mates. An awful lot of them are married and moved away. Some of the rest are roaming the country looking for mates.

While in montpelier we got some twenty-two shells and I have been murdering a good many pet squirrels. It rained a little bit last night and I expect it to rain a little more tonight.

The pet lambs are sure cute. They are surely tame. We feed them three times a day. Our garden doesn't look very good. It is quite dry. We got the water right after we got home. I milked the cows and fed the pigs and chickens. We have a few little turkeys and chickens.

Everyone else has gone to bed and we have to get up early in the morning to clean ditches to get all the water we can. Tell every one Hello and that I wish they could all come up here. Helen sends special love to Bickey. Love to all of you, Sean

Dear Mother Ream -

We were all glad to hear you were better and hope you will soon be much better and stronger. And hope you will be able to come to see us.

It is lovely here this morning cool and the sky such a deep blue. Helen called me for breakfast at seven. The girls are doing the work while I am writing. When we went to Salt Lake (Friday) we left the girls to take care of things. Uncle Hyrum slept here and helped them with the cows. We left about 8 a.m. - took Norma & her children down. It was a lovely ride down Emigration. Got to Uncle Hyrum's Crochets about nine. Stayed several hours. Had a good visit. Aunt Zetta fixed sandwiches and we had lunch before leaving.

Uncle Hyrum said he is going to Cal on the first and expects to go to see you. When we got to Logan it was raining and how it did come down - for just a little while.

We took Norma to her mother's she was very much surprised - and glad to. She is alone now Ted is married. And Buddy - the dog is dead. Norma will stay a week or two.

Got to Edna's for supper. They were very good to us. Mother was there she went down to conference on the seventh. She came home with us. We left Salt Lake about Sun morning. Had a fine trip home. Found them all O.K. at home.

Saturday morning we went down town. Met the bus - no one we knew on it they told us there would be one at twelve so we waited. No bus came. They had made a mistake. So we thought they would come in at night. Went up to Edna's had dinner. About ten thirty Mr Hallman phoned - said he had Jean and Helen down on 17th So State. It sure startled me. I got in the car and went right down. And were we glad to see them. Now we are home. They are both glad to be here and say they have had a wonderful time. We are going to clean the kitchen. Wish our house was finished. But will fix it up the best we can.
