On the west side the buds are just beginning to open so we can enjoy them for some time yet. I do love the lilacs. At times the air is just filled with their fragrance. The Japanese lilac

has large buds already, so it will be blooming earlier this year, too. The peonies have grown ever so much the past two weeks. I would love to see your beautiful roses. You have such a variety of them. My oleander has had fragrant white blossoms a little earlier this spring. We enjoy them. The past week has been stormy, tho' not a great deal of rain. The fields are all a soft green as well as the hills.

Friday school is out here. Today is the last full day. The school presented a pretty May festival Tuesday. Yesterday they had exams the first half of the forenoon, then lunched in Montpelier Canyon followed by a show in Montpelier. They were back here at about 6 o'clock.
