Dear Dad

Give it is an other year
& every thing is going fine if rather
slow. I hope you are all well down there.
Everyone here is ok. I am sure glad
your treatments are helping you. Was glad
to get your letter & will send this with
the fifty you wanted in the morning.

It is over to Paris the other
day & paid part of the taxes. They took
the interest from the delinquent taxes for 1931
but would do nothing for the 1932 taxes.
We were delinquent for the last half
of 1931. I paid that & the first half of 1933
leaving the 1932 taxes still delinquent. Waiting
for the loan with the Federal Land Bank.

We are having lovely weather for Idaho
rain & snow but very little frost. There is no frost
in the ground as the water soaks right in. There is
hardly enough snow for sleighing. I think I told
you before that the Starvalley cattle arrived on
the 14th of Dec. in a rain & snow storm. They are
still a little short on their payment. If they don't
come over in the next day or two I am going to

Close the deal & pay the remaining hay that
is not paid for.

The price of hay on the west side of
the lake has come down from one to two
dollars per ton. They are putting their good
lucern on the cars for ^{3.00}6.00 found in the
stack. They are asking from 2.50 to 3.50 for their
wild hay.

We had an offer of 2.75 for the staves the
other day but there was a cut back at 2.00 so
did not take it. I believe I can get 2.75 straight
through for all of yours if you will take it. Let
me know soon. Paulson is putting 700 lb white
face staves a 3.00 cut. That is heavier stuff
than what we want is it not.

Let me hear from you soon. Give my love
to all & tell them I will write soon
