noons in particular, have been al-
most hot. It has been most too
nice to be indoors.

Last week and the first two days
of this week the turkeys went to the
dressing plants. It was quite a pro-
blem this year, because help at the
plants was almost unobtainable.
The Tremonton plant (the main turkey
dressing plant) had to resort to
high school girls for pinners & Germany
war prisoners for the heavier work.
They come from Ogden by bus each
day. However, they did exceptionally
well and were glad to be able to
work. When our men went thru they
had been in the U.S. less than a
month. The turkeys were fine birds.

It is deer hunting season and
many of the local men can't settle
down to work. Rodney & Hershey are
hauling oats to the flats, 2 of the
men have come back from hunting &
are plowing while one is still hunt-
ing. Jim quit, as soon as he turned
30 to get a defense job in Ogden.

The baby has gained another pound,
stands alone & still has her grey or blue
eyes. We haven't settled on a name yet.

So take good care of yourself. we do so hope your eyes are much better
from the flu. I hope they will be in one year's time. I've had a file in it. I'll try to
