Dear mother:

It seems to have been quite a while since I wrote to you. Well, I finally got my grain out. I had a big loss on account of birds and animals. Didn't get much fall work done. We have had some cold weather and a little snow lately, but all in all it is a fairly over-season. I have not started to feed yet. I hope I do not have to until after Christmas.

Friday, Mr. Montpelier Mitchell told me about Uncle Albin. Then when I got home I got a call from Sam saying that Aunt Debra's oldest girl had died. She was the last of her girls alive and she was forty five years old. She died suddenly like all the others.

Mitchell took his family and me to Preston for the funeral Saturday at two o'clock. We went through Logan to take Lyneta Winter Smart to a funeral there. Had trouble with slippery ^{on}

roads and a flat tire but got to Prutton
in time to see Uncle Alvin. He was the
most beautiful crop that I have ever seen.

The services were very nice. The speaker did
no extreme praising such as often happens
but spoke of him as a man who had his
trials, faults and temptations but with all
one who was lovable for his kindness,
his desire to do right and his steadfast
loyalty to what he believed to be right. In
fact a man who had done the best that
he could and the best that he knew how.

They took him to Weston for burial.
We went over there. They dedicated the grave
but delayed lowering the coffin, waiting for
Aunt Quill's son Willard who had telephoned
that he was on his way and wanted to
see the casket. I don't know if we got there
as we had to leave.

We saw Aunt Roxie, Syble, and Dora.
Aunt Zetta was there. I would not have
known her, she is so thin. Uncle John
was unable to be there. Irving was there
but Alby could not come.

We got home about ten thirty that
night.

Sunday, Mitzie, Mable, Mame and I
went to stand for the burial at one.

of Sand have either left or died since
I taught there, and new ones have
moved in. But I saw quite a few
that I knew.

Just Decker's boys are doing well.
They are getting a lot of land and
having good crops.

Markle surely enjoyed himself
there. I suppose he will tell you
all about it.

Hope you are all well. Tell
Jimmy I will write to him soon.
