Dear Mother;

I have been so long writing that I am almost ashamed to write now.

A couple of weeks ago I had a dream about grandpa Crockett the first time I can remember of dreaming of him. There were a lot of people around and he was introducing you to some of them. That is about all that I can remember. I intended to write to you then but I could not find any paper, then first one thing and then another kept making me put it off from day to day. I haven't been feeling too well then there has been so much to do. I have just got through delivering 1600 bu. of wheat. Took the loss in yesterday and spent the money. I sold 1000 bu for 50¢ and 600 bu for 55¢. It cost a little more than 3¢ to get it delivered. So, you see it did not bring much. Paid some of the most urgent debts. Now, I am broke again. I have bargained 600 bu. at 55¢ a bu. but I am afraid the people will not come for it. If they do I am going to use that money to lay lumber to start on the house. I thought I would have it started by now but things have interfered so much that it looks doubtful if I can start this fall.

I planted 55 acres of fall wheat and intended plowing a hundred acres. I got down on pine plowed and I galled

that is about all I will get done this fall. It has
been so stormy that plowing did not go well. And
now it has been snowing for twenty four hours.
There are several inches here now. It won't last
long once it clears off, but I am afraid it is in
Pine Springs for the winter. I hope I do not have
to start feeding now for I haven't too much hay.

I guess you heard of the train killing the
sheep 32 for me and 10 for M.A. 15 of mine
were lambs that I was going to ship in two
days. I dressed out 17 of them and had them
frozen so will have meat for a long time.

Sam Socks came and gave me \$13⁰⁰ for the hides
yesterday. He said he had bought more than 300 deer
hide so far and expected to buy that money more.
So, you can see that there was a lot of deer killed
this year. I never went out. M.A. killed three, they
say. We have not had a trout of one yet though.

Well Norma had a baby girl. We did not
know about it though until we read it in the paper
and the neighbors told about it then. Momie and I
went to the Hospital to see her the other day. She
was doing fine.

You know, I did not know a thing about Uncle
George and Aunt Bell until Sylvia's wife Millie
told me the other day. She said that all she knew
was what she read in the paper. She is running for
County Treasurer. He told me when we were attending
a rally.

Tell Eda that I have paid the Tom Lyon and that
the part belonging to the house was \$52.24. She can send me
a check as soon as she can. Love Wesley.

Dear Mother Pearl

I hope you are well. We have had an awful storm. It snowed nearly all night. It looks as if our sheep will have to come in. This snow will stay on up there. The sun is shining this morning but Deuby says the storm is not over. It is leaking in all the rooms. Mother seems a little better she is still here. Wish we had taken her to Salt Lake before the storm. but I guess we will as soon as it clears and the roads are good. Garson went down Saturday morning to take Ruth to the Dr., but it was too stormy to take mother. Ruth's hand is about the same her arm seems hard. The Dr. is going to

try X-ray treatments. He says he has never seen anything like it.

Jeau went hunting and got a doe and then the next day while boxing he fell and broke the bone, in his wrist, next to the thumb. He has it in a cast and says in his letter that he would have to keep it on for two weeks more. Says it is better.

We are wondering if we could take the bed to Enclines when we take Mother I asked Chesley and he said he thought it would be all right if you said for me to let her go on using it. We cannot get one. So you tell me what to do. He will bring Mother back when it gets warmer.

The girls are busy as can be. It is Mary Ida's birthday today. Hasn't seem long since she was born.

Hazel Dawn was thrilled with her

letter. She has so many reasons that she doesn't
take time to write why she will do just what
you have seen Kim + Ruth and had a good visit with them.
