Dear Grandma,

Your letter came while I was visiting with my girl friend in Moscow. The last twenty-five miles coming back I got so excited about getting some mail and your letter kept me from being disappointed. It is quite a relief to hear that the folks are safe in the P.T. And we can wish that this war was over.

I got a letter from Mom yesterday and she expounded on the disadvantages of getting married in these times - If she only knew that all my particular friends are scattered from one end of the U.S. to the other - Georgia, California and Alaska - so that aspect of my future is postponed for a while I guess. But really, there are so many jobs and good opportunities for young people around here that I'm not worried and I'm going into the last half of the last

semester with the idea of
keeping up my grades and
enjoying the whole time as
much as possible.

Spring has really come to
the campus here - and with
spring we are ushering in a
new service to the Navy - 600
sailors will arrive on the
campus Friday April 10 to take
radio training - (An 8-12 weeks
course - so it is summer). And
with the arrival of spring I've
got my roller skates out - the
same ones Uncle Kenneth gave
me - and with a few new
wheels these are good as ever.

Mom didn't say much about
the weather at home but I guess
it is awful cold yet. Phyllis
Lyons died two weeks ago with
a type of cramp.

Have you heard that Bear Lake
is getting a big airport on the road
between Park and Dingle. It's
supposed to be able to land
any size plane that's in
existence today.

Our grades came out
last week - I did pretty
good - got three A's - (One in
an Animal Husbandry course -

but it's very interesting) Today
I was informed that I had
made the University Women's
Rifle Team.

Lots of the girls went to Spokane
this week for the Inland Empire
teachers meeting - they plan to
get jobs - most of the superintend-
ents attend.

I'd like to see Aunt Ruthie &
Uncle Kenneth's baby - she is
just as cute and clever as
can be and probably growing up fast.

My best girl friend started
to work as secretary for the
Dean of Women and she wants
me to stay with her and go
to school next summer. It
sounds pretty good - I could
take some of the things that
I've wanted to take just for
my own interests.
