

Caden July 5, 1855

My dear Friend

I am still here in Caden & did not get away yesterday as I expected Will be off by an early boat tomorrow
I found all the members of the procession I wrote them from Bristol & told them I would be near 7 o'clock They were not a little surprised at my coming but agreed to lead me providing I would put two hours on the procession - & help them to get ready - which I did.
Mr. Parker said he would

have been part of the
possession to get on 5th
and not go to the park
and by 10 some would be
way back by noon. The
police were commenced at
7 o'clock but on such occasions
they allow about 100 ft.
space. In this case it was 1/2
& when they came to 5th. This was
now impossible so they had to keep
up the street to the park & did not
get back till 12 1/2 past - but all
of them were came back & was
ready to commence loading
nothing too very much. By this time
I was beginning to be some
interested & had almost come
the conclusion to stay.
The men promised to come on
Monday or even today if I would
only let them look up so I told

them I would wait until Monday

except I saw I employed many
