the door. So they said they would
go & get some one to take the door
frame out, but they did not come
back.

Yesterday I stayed with Roxie
children while she went to
the ward school & took Terry
& Ida, to see if the teacher
would have them. They wanted
to go so bad. She took them &
said she would see Miss
Hubbard as, they went two
yesterday & today & Miss Hubbard
said they were too young - Ida
was so taken up with school
she loved to go. I wish there

was a kindergarten so she
could go. The boys all like to
go to school very much - even
Lee.

Sunday the 17th 1897.

Dear Will I will try & finish
 my letter as I can post it
 to morrow so you will get it
 Tuesday - We got moved in

this house yesterday. Rose
washed him & I straightened
up things after school.

I sent Wesley down town
after a piece of bacon, & a
broom - He came back
quite sick - took a heavy
chill. He ate no supper &
seemed very sick, about nine
o'clock he was so sick I was
frightened, he was delirious.
I had him administered
to & he went to sleep. Sleep
pretty well all night but has
not been able to be up today.
He ate a very little once but
threw it up. I think it is a
heavy cold he took from having
wet feet. It has been so stormy
all week & his shoes have completely
given out, they are in holes all
over. I thought they would last

till you came down - but I
will have to get him a pair
tomorrow if he is well enough
for me to leave. I have, even
five dollars, and nothing
hardly on hand, but I will
get along till you come down
I do not see how you can
thrust it, is so stormy did
not the hail & storm hurt
the oats a good deal?
Oh well I would like to see
you so much - I am so lonesome
today - Well I must quit for
now for the children are wanting
supper & I must get it.
