My Dear
Miss. Sarah Crockett

Sarah I did not get home in time to ans. your letter on Friday so will do so this morning Yes Nov. is a very good month; but rather late some falls is quite disagreeable in Iowa Sep. would have been a better one but it will be impossible to go then it seems unless we wait another year which I am not willing to do

Sarah you may name the day and month I leave it to you entirely

What suits you best will please me so you can make arrangements Sarah may want to change the time or other events to consider that - Will know nothing of and I think it best that we set the time I will be ready any time after Nov. 1st.

Sarah you speak of the event as not being very important which surprises me I was thinking it one of the most important one in my life. You seem to look at it in a different light

Well if it is ^{not} important -
with you I suppose it will
make but little difference to
the mother it may take place
in, and should the trip not be
as pleasant as it might have
been I am well & can but little
I was want to make the trip
a pleasant one & have it in
a good season of the year
So I will not be down
until Nov. 1st that I know
now. Yes I will be very
busy for some time through
harvesting and thrashing.

Yes I do differ with
bro A. Just had one the
other day in regard to cutting
my wheat. He promised
that he would not take any
other persons a head of mine
& when I told him yesterday
my grain was ready he said
he would cut it as soon as he
came to it & asked him if he
was not done cutting for those
he had promised & if mine was
not next in turn he
said he had promised others
to cut & would not break
his promise I told ^{him} that was
all I asked & all I wanted was
my grain cut - he said he
would not leave any man's grain
& cut another's I told him mine
was a head of theirs I did not
want him to leave it for
others. He turned white & got quite
rathic & said he would cut it
when he came to it. Then I told

him I would see that he
come to it soon. We had other
words & I left the field & see
they had the desired affect
for he has just come & told
me this morning that he would
cut it & has sent word to those
he promised that he would not
be able to cut these. Now I will
try & keep out of contentions &
quarrels as long as possible
but one thing sure my rights
has got to be respected by all
men I do not wish to dominate
& won't suffer it even if I must
quarrel a little. Right should be
respected at all times by any
& all persons I always think
of Now when I get in to such
difficulties and it has a great influence
on. You say they are going
to have only two turns in the
adjoining room. It would be
nice if I could secure them
but I hardly think I'll try if
I should & get them I would
not want you to teach

Now I will not write any more
this morning I am going to My
& will expect a letter or two from you
Yours I have not gotten any paper
yet I forgot it when I was at St. L.
Aug. the 30 1885 just 2 o'clock and your
school is out Until then I am
Ever Thine Samuel
Will.
