Dear friend I find
myself writing you another
short line which I had not
intended to have done
I arrived here yesterday
afternoon I received your
second letter in Ogden
on last Mo. eve. but had
some shipping to do and could
not answer it. On Tues. I started
to Cin. and have been going
ever since until yesterday
when I got here

When I went to the Post,
I found your third and fourth
letters which was quite welcome
and unlooked for

I started to call on you last
even but thought it unwise and
turned back as I could make
no reasonable excuse (For which
I am very sorry for now)

This morning I took the gun
and started hunting expecting

to find my game at River Dell
but I started South of the
Temple and followed the river
up finding occasionally a
rabbit a duck or frog but
killing nothing and at length
I arrived at my destination
to find that my bird had flown

to my great disappointment
on my return I look for no
game but pondered over my
blighted thoughts

I would like to have one
more good talk with you
before I leave again as I am

going to start soon I finished
all of my work Sat. afternoon and
only have to settle up my bag
at Ogden then I will be free
for a while I had good luck this
time but a hard trip

Have discharged all of my
men and I guess I will quit
the business Well now I am
likely to go to Ogden any
time will go as soon as I get
word Am looking for a letter to
day (but may not get it this
week) and would like to see
you before I return

I would call but I have run
out of excuses and as your parents
do not wish me to condescend would be
pleased to meet you at your appoin-
ted place I must thank you
for your welcome letters for they
gave me much pleasure.
