as well as I do. You  
enjoy yourself as well as you  
can but don't fail to write to  
your Will frequent & long  
letters. For I look for them  
with anxious eyes & wonder  
if you have a very long  
lesson or not that keeps  
you from writing. T. L.  
says that the next time  
he goes to L. with me  
he is going to shine me  
down - seems like I have  
quite a few opponents  
in the field, & I fear  
some of them not that  
your I will prove untrue  
but some how like they  
will do me no good & in  
what way I can't tell

again - or not? If not what  
kind of punishment will  
they have to endure +  
how long I have no  
bible here + I cant find  
what I want - to tell you  
so will have to wait
