we are living about four
miles from Quesnoy and
cannot get there only on
snow shoes. we are working and get them. I am
a mine here with varied
success so far we have
our winter supplies all
in and it is little we
care how deep the snow
falls. we only work a
bout eight hours per
day therefore you will
see that I will have
plenty of time to read
long letters it is still
gratifying to me to know
that you are still discharging
your duties with cheerfulness
it is needless to say that
I expected any thing less
of you & sympathize with

you in your long walks
whether they are solitary
or not. I would like to
love you in snow shoes
if you would come up
and get them. I am
sorry to say that my time
out of work is not used
to such good purpose
as yours is. playing whist
and reading novels is the
order of the day if you
can suggest any thing
better in this far me
to do in this god-forsaken
country I will adopt the
suggestion with pleasure
this is a healthy country
but it is not conducive
to high spirits. considering
just now it is Christmas
times it is rather a hard
