He is figuering on putting in six aceres of potatoes, six or seven acers of onions and three or for acres of sugar beets, I am to founrsh old Ben and Prince, chain harnes and the Cooper wagon and machinery to cultivate with. He is to manure the ground, founrsh the seed, I watethe crops take care them, harvest them and give me half of all that he raises but the beets. for them I pay him two dollars and fifty cents for every ton that he raises He is living in the old cellar under the hill. Baching and boarding him self. He seems to be a pretty good worker but is a kind of a crank.

Mod and Bill are looking fine. Every thing on the ranch is fat and looking fine.

WE killed three hogs the other day and are going to kill three more tomorrow, they brought \$45.21 these will be biger that we kill tomorrow: we are getting 11¢ per pound dressed.

Havn't sold any hay as yet only \$50 worryh I sold to NOWland. Wont be able to ship any cattle until after Thanksgiving. I have a chance to sell my hay but hav not made any deal as yet I may bale the most of it or I may buy sheep I dont know which it will be yet,
