

Sept. 10 - 1943

My Dear Wesley and Mamie.
I hope the girls got home alright and
not too hard a trip. We miss them
very much. But I am glad I still
have Mary Ida. She is a grand girl.
The weather is grand and sunshiny
now. I am real well. Ida's family
are well too. She has to go to a teacher's
meeting today and will leave Beulah
Lee with me while she is at meeting.
I told her of her August payment
when you wrote it to me. She said
she would send you the money out
of her first check. Her school
starts Monday. I am sorry she
could not pay sooner. I know you
need your money - but it has been
hard on her. She works so hard.
Bob is still on his vacation. Not
that he is any help any way. Makes
more work for her. I hope you folks

are all well and not working too hard.
If you are not too busy there is
something I would like you to do
for me. I want it very much and
I think you are the only ones that
can do it for me. I could do it in
a minute or so if I were there. It
is to go up to the house and get me
a certain book. I can not tell you
just where it is as I used to could.
The book is the recitation book I
used when I helped to get suffrage
for the women in Idaho. I don't even
remember the name on the book but
it is one I sent for when I had to work
to get suffrage all the pieces are on
that subject. It was still there when
I straightened up the books 2 years ago.
I put it with the books of poetry and
recitations - on about the 3 shelf from
the top, north of the middle of the book case.
as near as I can remember the book is

about 6 inches long and about 5 inches wide
and about $\frac{3}{4}$ inches thick, and of a yellow color.
This description may not be just ^{right} ~~worse~~
but as near as I can remember,
but I know I put it with the books
of poetry and recitations - so it ought
not be too hard to find and I know I
put them north of the middle starting
at the middle and continuing north.
On the ~~do~~ night we held our rally
the night before election I recited
a recitation that made a big hit.
I want it for that piece to give in
our meeting of the "Daughters of the
Pioneers of Utah." I can't ~~remember~~ ^{remember}
all but it starts out like this -
"Hans Handerkauf stood on the stack
His wife stood on the load -
an advocate of equal rights -
Came walking down the road.
Said he, I have a paper here -

For all good men to sign -
Who think that women's rights ^{should} be
The same as yours and mine.
Said Hans - I sign dot paper sure -
I always think you see
Dot ~~women~~^{women} should work the same
As you and me." "That may not be just right but as near
as I can remember, there is a lot more
I remember the meaning of it all but not the
words right. I hope you can find it
for me and send it by mail not later
than the last of September. I need it.
If Rodney keeps the doors locked
and you have not a pass key - get the
key of them - but get me the book if you
can. I'll try and do you a favor when
I can +
